"Yeh, and you're crazy, so what else is new?"

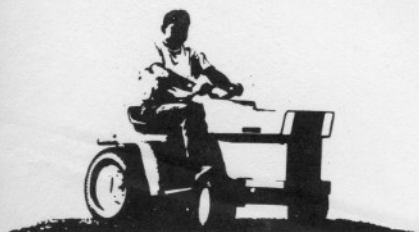
"Listen, 5 dollars says they win tomorrow's game."

The Winning Team

Who wins the pennant this year may be important, but not as important as your life and health. So why not pay a little more attention to your on-the-job safety this season?

And while you're at it, convince your co-workers to do the same. Make a "pitch" for safety -- for everyone's sake.

After all, you're part of a team. And one unsafe worker can jeopardize the safety of all the rest.

One careless worker who doesn't bother to report a hazard he sees, who refuses to clean up his work area, or who insists on dangerous horseplay on the job, is endangering the safety of those who work around him. He's not the kind of team member anyone needs -- he makes for a losing team.

So work with your safety, and the safety of your co-workers, in mind at all times. Start by setting a good example:

- Keep your work area clean and neat. Don't let your carelessness or sloppiness cause a co-worker to be injured.
- If you should notice a hazard, don't keep it to yourself. Report it to Maintenance or your supervisor immediately. After all, it's what you'd expect others to do.
- Don't scoff at safety rules or measures. Instead, encourage safety among your co-workers. Remember, their carelessness could mean injury to you. Safe conditions can be achieved only when everyone pitches in to make the company hazard-free.

So get in the swing of things this season. Be a safety booster -- all the way.
